Butterfly Identification Course

For some years I've been asking Butterfly Conservation for recordings of an online butterfly identification course that I ran in 2020 and 2021 to be made available to all BC volunteers. The course comprises five one-hour sessions, systematically going through each of the UK butterfly species and how to identify them, plus a final session on day-flying moths. I'm pleased to say that four butterfly identification recordings are now available via 'Assemble' (Butterfly Conservation's volunteer portal). Hopefully the presentation on day-flying moths will become available in due course.

If you'd like to view the recordings as a refresher to butterfly identification, whether you're a beginner or someone who wants to develop your knowledge and skills further, you'll need to be registered on Assemble as a BC volunteer. Once registered, you need to log into Assemble, and then go to the **Document hub**. Then click on **G. Recording and Monitoring**, and drill down further by clicking on **Butterfly Identification**, then **Butterfly Identification Course**.

Finally, I'd just like to wish you all a successful and enjoyable 2025 butterfly recording season, hopefully with plenty of warm sunny weather!

Reserves News

It's not been a good start to the year. Someone smashing up the 'Dogs on Leads' signs, graffiti sprayed over the side of the container, and a sheep attacked and badly injured by a dog at Yew Hill. It's been an eye-opener how many people blatantly ignore 'Sheep Grazing – Dogs on Leads' signs. We now have a policy of 'No Dogs' at Yew Hill when the sheep are there.

A shining light through it all has of course been the reserves volunteers. They have done an incredible amount of work clearing scrub, footpaths, repairing fences and given endless help. Each reserve has an awesome volunteer team I can rely on and together we have kept the reserves in good shape.

Magdalen Hill Down

The gorgeous cows and sheep bring Magdalen Hill to life in the depths of winter. The cows have been in the main Pathfield, often accompanied by Roe deer and even Skylarks this early in the season. The cows don't seem bothered by the joggers and all the people going by. The sheep will graze the Hillside and the Allotments before heading off for summer. The Livestock Lookers made sure the troughs were clear of ice during the cold weather.

There are still lots of birds such as Yellowhammer, Bullfinch, Long-tailed Tit, Stonechat, Redwing and, of course, Kestrel and Red Kite. I saw the moment a stoat killed a rabbit – fascinating to see.

Southern Water have completed the new reservoir at Hill Top. They will be sowing some seed collected from the Extension field at Magdalen Hill Down this spring for grassland restoration and hope to collect more seed from the Extension field in mid-August. There is the possibility we may get grazing back at Hill Top this year and be able to start the transect again.



North Baddesley Nature Reserve

Well, what can I say about 2024 that you don't already know? Only 27 butterfly species seen. I know some people would say that is still very good, but not when you consider 31 species were seen in 2023.

I am pleased to say that most species were still seen in good numbers, apart from Holly Blue, Common Blue, Small Tortoiseshell and Purple Emperor.

For some reason, possibly attributed to climate change, I did not see any Brown Argus, Small Heath, Dingy Skipper or Clouded Yellow. All of these species have been seen here in previous years. Those butterflies that were observed were seen at unusual times and for shorter periods. Luckily (if you can call it that) this seems to follow countywide trends rather than being an isolated concern for my reserve.

A few other species were very short on numbers including Bee-fly, Six-spot Burnet and wasp spiders. No caterpillars were seen on the nettles for the first time since we started recording.

Reptiles did very well apart from an upsetting sight one day, when I came across three dead adders. Many people, including some experts, looked at the photos and discussed it. Nobody is really sure what killed them but due to the pattern of injuries, pheasants seemed to be the number one suspect.

One bit of good news is that water shrews are now being seen here fairly regularly, which is a new species for my site.

Another mystery occurred. We were noticing an unknown bird now and again but could only determine that it was a type of bird of prey. Anyway, a birder visited and happened to see it and said that it was a peregrine falcon! Since then, it has been seen and heard regularly and one occasion two were heard calling to each other, so hopefully a breeding pair.

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Newsletter Production

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It feels eerily strange that recent BC history is repeating itself. In 2021, H&IOW Branch Main Committee resigned en bloc when the BC leadership removed responsibility for managing our reserves with no input into the decision from the branch. This spring, there's déjà vu over crucial restructuring plans.

The 'process' followed in this restructuring means yet again that there has been no input from Main Committee members, while the BC leadership team cannot reveal publicly any meaningful detail at this juncture. And so there is now a void between the branch and BC. I asked BC head office for some guidance for members: the statement I received is on p2.

I've been a branch member since 1983. Over the years I have welcomed the opportunities to contribute to branch activities and the collective *local* effort in supporting butterfly and moth conservation nationally. I well remember George Yorke's tenure of the branch and the successful acquisition of the Magdalen Hill Down and Yew Hill reserves in the 1990s, with the subsequent success the branch has had in running and developing its BC reserves. Not actively seeking branch input is disrespectful to the legacy of all H&IOW members that have worked over the years to acquire, maintain and develop the reserves.

My first job was working for the Nature Conservancy Council (as it was back in 1982) and I learnt that, at heart, nature conservation is a field craft. There appears to be a worrying trend towards office-based conservation, and my personal view is that this doesn't serve the best interests of butterflies and moths.

This is the last newsletter I'll be producing. Having had the privilege of editing the newsletter since 2014, covering 26 editions, the time has

come for someone else to take up the reins. I'd like to pass on a huge thank you to Rosemary and Dan, who have contributed so generously to the newsletter over the years, with their wonderful artworks and design skill. My grateful thanks to all H&IOW members who have contributed articles to the newsletter over the years.

Fully echoing Kevin's words and sentiments, this newsletter will also be our last. A decision arrived at with some sadness and disappointment.
