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New Butterfly Red List published

An important update to **the Butterfly Red List** was released on the 25th May. This report provides a comprehensive review of the status of all butterfly species in the UK. From the Press Release:

- 24 species of butterfly are now listed as threatened including 8 that are Endangered – representing a substantial increase compared with the previous assessment.
- The risk of extinction is increasing for more species than decreasing.
- There is some hope for species that have been the focus of intense conservation work and have been brought back from the brink of extinction.

Wildlife charity Butterfly Conservation is warning that time is running out to save some of Britain's best-loved insects, with the latest Red List assessment of butterflies published today, revealing a 26% increase in the number of species threatened with extinction.

Using data gathered by volunteers through the UK Butterfly Monitoring Scheme and Butterflies for the New Millennium recording scheme, scientists from Butterfly Conservation have put together the new Red List, which assesses all the butterfly species that have bred regularly in Great Britain against the rigorous criteria of extinction risk set out by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN). The new Red List is published today in the journal Insect Conservation and Diversity.

Of the 62 species assessed, four are extinct in Britain (Black-veined White, Large Tortoiseshell, Large Copper, and Mazarine Blue) with 24 (41% of the remaining species) classed as threatened (8 Endangered, 16 Vulnerable) and a further five (9%) as Near Threatened.

2021 Garden Butterfly Survey

As always a big thank you to all those recorders who participated in the Garden Butterfly Survey. Records were received from 57 gardens, which is actually the fewest since this survey became quantitative in 2016.

A total of 5,137 records were received, amounting to 8,791 butterflies of 33 different species.

Small White was once again the most abundant species recorded, followed by Red Admiral, with Holly Blue falling back to eighth place from third in 2020. Comma has remained in tenth position for the last three years.

The bracketed figures denote the species records position in the Common Species Table in our 2021 Annual Butterfly Report. Note that, once again, Holly Blue appeared to fare better in gardens than in the wider countryside.

Once again, a garden near Andover recorded over 1,000 butterflies. 65% of the participating gardens were in South Hampshire, 28% in North Hampshire and 7% on the Isle of Wight.



In 2021, gardens participating in the survey covered less than 4% of the tetrads (2km squares) within our Branch boundary - even fewer than in the previous year. So if you are interested, please sign up at <u>Garden Butterfly Survey</u> as our gardens are becoming a very special environment and haven for butterflies and other insects, etc. The website has been re-constructed and even those who submitted records previously will need to register again (but then can be linked to their historical entries).

Enjoy your gardens this year and I look forward to receiving your 2022 records.

Reserves & Volunteering News

Magdalen Hill Down

It's an intoxicating time of year, with the warm sunshine bringing the best butterfly activity. Magdalen saw the early emergence of Small Blues and the Adonis. The Dingy Skipper and Green Hairstreaks seem to be doing well, which gives some hope when you hear of all the declines.

We have four rather fat, and very relaxed-looking cows grazing the Allotments and western end of the Reserve. The forty sheep on the Hillside are keeping the turf height short, to favour the Adonis and Chalkhill Blues.

The permissive footpath along the boundary of the Extension has been re-opened.



The path which goes down the centre of the field will be reopened, once the Skylarks have finished nesting.

School visits are now contracted-out to Winchester Science Centre, who are continuing to deliver our outdoor learning sessions.

We have reduced the number of sheep to 15, as the reserve was becoming over-grazed. It's not practical to move the sheep off somewhere and then have to transport them back, so hopefully this number will keep a nice sward height to ensure a variety of flowers. The Southern Water meadow area is looking better. The chalk scrapes do get full sun, despite being so near to the trees. **There is still a huge amount of scrub to clear...**

Chilcomb Sports Ground Butterfly Scrape (SU499289)

Hampshire County Council kindly gave us funding to plant and manage a chalk scrape, in order to increase diversity in the recreation ground and provide a vital habitat patch for the Small Blue and Striped Lychnis moth, amongst others. We have also left an area of long grass.

The area was planted in April by our volunteers during an extremely dry, hot spell. Armed with water canisters, the plug plants were watered a few times, but the ground was baked! Thankfully, the seeds germinated following rain, and little specks of green are now covering the chalk (although the plants are still struggling from lack of rain).

The plan is to install a signboard to explain about chalk grassland plants and the life cycle of the Striped Lychnis moth, and Small Blue.

Striped Lychnis moth Surveys - help needed!

We need volunteers to help survey for the Striped Lychnis caterpillar which can be found munching on the Dark Mullein plants that flower in July. I know some of you are familiar with this caterpillar, but training in ID will be given to anyone interested.

Bentley Station Meadow school visit

I was contacted by the Head of Early Years, at Frensham Heights School about a visit to the reserve (twenty-one 3-to-5 year olds). So, I said "Yes, I'd love to host them", thinking what could go wrong?

They arrived by train (I think this was the highlight of the trip, actually!), and met me at the reserve entrance - I think they were a little disappointed that I wasn't Steve Backshall...

The helpers divided the party into small groups in order to explore the meadow; sadly, the dull weather meant no flying butterflies. However, we did scare up a few Speckled Yellow (*P. macularia*) moths, found a mat of Grasshopper eggs, and a couple of Drinker (*E. potatoria*) moth caterpillars. Common spotted-orchids (*D. fuchsii*) and Ragged robin (*L. flos-cuculi*) demonstrated the difference that water plays in where plants grow.

There was just enough time for a quick sweep-net exercise, and bug pots of beetles, spiders, and bugs were passed around, with only a few of the children recoiling in horror. The hand lens was an object of much fascination.

I hope one or two little minds will become interested in butterflies and our natural world as a result of their visit.

Wilder Countryside Butterfly Scheme (WCBS)

If you would like to record butterflies but can't commit to carrying out a regular transect walk, would you be able to help with the Wider Countryside Butterfly Survey?

This is a UK wide 'light touch' recording scheme for monitoring butterfly numbers across the country. Results from these surveys feed into national statistics that inform policy makers about the health of the environment.

Volunteers take 'ownership' of a randomly selected 1km OS grid square, walking two parallel transect lines through the square at least once in July and once in August, identifying and recording any butterflies seen. Walks need to take place in good weather and follow the same methodology used for butterfly transects.

No experience is necessary - just an interest in butterflies, a willingness to learn, normal eyesight and the ability to get to and from the square and to walk the route safely.

Because squares are selected randomly they can cover any type of habitat, including urban areas and farmland as well as more natural areas. In some cases the landowner's permission is required before walks can take place.

A number of squares have been identified in Hampshire and the Isle of Wight which require walkers for 2022. These include some squares which already have a route

established, as well as others that have not yet been walked. A full list of available squares can be found <u>here</u>, on the Branch website.

2022 Butterflies in Churchyards

During the week commencing Saturday 4th June a number of UK churches have been involved with the 'Churches Count on Nature' event, run by charities A Rocha UK, the Church of England, and the Church in Wales. Last year 17,232 records were received embracing over 1,500 different species. All recorded on the <u>National Biodiversity Network</u>.



Some of you may already be involved with this event, but

this could be an opportunity for us to boost butterfly records in churchyards by visiting perhaps a couple of times during the peak season of July/August, and adding these records to one of our accepted systems which will eventually reach the same database. Please ensure you include 'Churchyard' in your Site Location field.

The Upper Thames Branch of Butterfly Conservation have been monitoring around 50 churchyards for some years now, so that seems to be an ideal target for our membership!
