### **Transect News**

Firstly, let me thank everyone who was involved in butterfly transect walks in 2024. We now have more than 200 active transects being walked in Hampshire and Isle of Wight, which is probably the highest total of any Butterfly Conservation branch. The data obtained is so important for understanding local, regional and national trends, and for identifying those species in greatest need of conservation action.

2024 was undoubtedly a disappointing season, with numbers for most species being 30-40% down relative to 2023. There will be discussion of the results in the branch Spring Newsletter.

#### Assemble registration

In my role as Transect Co-ordinator for Hampshire & Isle of Wight, can I just remind you that Butterfly Conservation requires all volunteer transect walkers to please <a href="register with">register with</a> "Assemble". This is necessary for insurance purposes and other reasons. You will already have received correspondence about this, but can I just give you a prompt if you've yet to get round to doing it. When I checked a couple of weeks back, there were 142 Hampshire & Isle of Wight transect walkers registered with Assemble, which is a great start, but I think there are probably at least double that number who walk transects, so there are certainly others who need to join.

If you've already registered with Assemble, perhaps as a volunteer involved with practical conservation volunteering on our reserves, you don't need to register again, but you will need to check that "UKBMS Transect Surveyor (Hampshire & Isle of Wight)" is tagged as an additional volunteering role in your role profile on Assemble.

My future intention is to group message all transect walkers via Assemble, which will make communication a lot easier for me, and will mean that I can get information to you more quickly. If, however, your role profile doesn't list you as a "UKBMS Transect Surveyor (Hampshire & Isle of Wight)" you won't get the message. I'm not sure that you can add additional roles yourself, within Assemble, so you may need to contact someone at BC Head Office to add 'transect surveyor' to your profile.

### New Forest Butterfly Transect Group report

The New Forest National Park Authority's **Volunteer Fair** was opened by Sir Julian Lewis, the local MP, on Sunday, January 26th in Brockenhurst village hall. This year, 53 organisations were in attendance, hoping to attract volunteers to join their organisation. The opportunities on offer varied from helping-out in local hospitals, heritage organisations, community groups as well as national and local wildlife conservation groups - one of which was the New Forest Butterfly Transect Group, of course!

It was a busy day, with a number of visitors coming to talk to us about their interest in butterflies and expressing a willingness to get involved. Transect walking is not suitable for everyone because of the criteria needed to obtain a valid result - for those people we recommended that they download the iRecord App. Fourteen people left their details, and stated that they would like to join a team this year, with several others taking our contact details, with the intention of getting in touch once they had thought about the commitment required. We were also approached by one of the organisers of the New Forest Show who is keen to have a butterfly presence in the Heart of the Forest area.

### Reserves report

It's not been a good start to the year. Someone smashing-up the "Dogs on leads" signs; graffiti sprayed over the side of the container; and a sheep attacked and badly injured by a dog at Yew Hill. (It's been an eye-opener how many people blatantly ignore 'Sheep Grazing. Dogs on Leads' signs.) Sadly, as a result, we now have a policy "No Dogs at Yew Hill", when the sheep are there.

A shining light through it all has of course been the volunteers. They have done an incredible amount of work clearing scrub, footpaths, repairing fences, and given endless help. Each reserve has an awesome volunteer team I can rely on and together we have kept the reserves in good shape.

#### Magdalen Hill Down

The gorgeous cows and sheep bring Magdalen Hill to life in the depths of winter. The cows are in the main Pathfield, often accompanied by Roe deer and even Skylarks this early in the season. The cows don't seem bothered by the joggers and all the people going by. The sheep will graze the Hillside and the Allotments before heading off for summer. The Livestock Lookers made sure the troughs were clear of ice during the cold spell, and managed to keep on with the daily checks in all weathers.

There are still lots of birds such as Yellowhammer, Bullfinch, Long-tailed Tit, Stonechat, Redwing and of course Kestrel and Red Kite. Of note was a Dartford Warbler being present through November / December. I also saw the moment a stoat killed a rabbit – fascinating to see!

#### Yew Hill

Southern Water has completed the new reservoir at Hill Top. They will be sowing some seed, collected from the Extension field at Magdalen Hill Down last summer, for grassland restoration. They also hope to collect more seed (again, from the Extension field) around mid-August. There is the possibility we may get grazing back at Hill Top this year and be able to start the transect again.

#### **Bentley Station Meadow**

I'm thrilled to see the wildflowers returning with Primrose already trying to flower and Betony spreading all over. The reserve is looking like it should and not just a total thicket of Bramble. We left patches of young Blackthorn around the edges of the meadow for the Brown Hairstreak.

We just need the butterflies to come back! It shows how weather has the biggest impact.
