# **Branch Committee News**

For those who haven't seen the **12th June** news item on the Branch News webpage...

Statement to branch members from Head Office. The future of the Hampshire Branch.

On June 9th staff and volunteers in Hampshire came together to discuss the current situation with the Branch and the way ahead for our work in Hampshire. We met for an hour then headed to Magdalen Hill Down for a picnic lunch and walk led by Fiona Scully, who has now been confirmed in a permanent role as Reserves Officer.

We talked through the significant amount of work still happening in the county; we have (at least!) 297 volunteers in the county who carry out a wide range of activities, including recording and monitoring, compiling the Branch E-Newsletter and updating the Branch website as well as key leadership roles such as Transect Co-Ordinator, WCBS Champion, Walks Leaders and County Recorders. And, of course, practical work on our reserves continues, led by Fiona and supported by a vital team of practical conservation volunteers, livestock lookers and recorders.

We are truly grateful to all volunteers who have contributed to our work in the county and to those who continue to do so. At a difficult time for charities across the UK and a worrying time for nature, your support is more important than ever and every act of kindness makes a difference.

Looking ahead, we are very aware of the challenges that all our Branches in the UK have been facing in recruiting to committee roles. Across the voluntary sector, participation in volunteering has declined 45% over the last 10 years and the appetite for volunteering in a committee role has halved. Therefore, in discussion with Andy Barker (Transect Co-Ordinator, former Branch Chair and Trustee) we have agreed to proceed in Hampshire without a Branch Committee. Instead, volunteers will continue to lead activities as they currently do and staff will set up new locally targeted volunteer groups as needed, such as survey groups or for habitat management work off-reserves. This will allow us to focus our time where we can make the most difference on the ground, helping butterflies, moths and the environment in Hampshire.

## **Transect News**

#### Transect Recorders' Conference – 26 October 2025

In the previous e-News I announced my intention to organise a Hants & Isle of Wight Transect Recorders' Conference this autumn, to celebrate the 50th anniversary of UK Butterfly Transect Recording. I can now confirm that **Littleton Millennium Hall** has now been booked for **Sunday 26 October** to host such a meeting, and I'm in the process of drawing up the programme for the day.

Following the format of previous meetings, the intention is for the meeting to run from **10:00am until 3:00pm**. It will be a great opportunity to socialise, as well as hear presentations on topics such as long-term species trends, use of transect data to guide conservation management, and how to get more from your data within UKBMS.

#### Early impressions of the 2025 butterfly season

Given how poor 2024 was, I think most of us were apprehensive about how butterflies would fare in 2025. But after a warm, dry and sunny spring, followed by some very hot weather during early summer, I think we've all been pleasantly surprised by the upturn in fortunes for most species and the overall increase in butterfly numbers.

The other thing that's been apparent is **early emergence**. For many butterflies, the flight season seems to have started a good two weeks earlier than usual. I fully expect the all-time earliest Hants & Isle of Wight emergence dates for several species to be broken this year, judging by what I've seen on the Branch website and have heard through conversations with friends. With the season rushing by so quickly, it may result in an abrupt end - I'm already getting the sense that hibernators, such as Brimstone and Peacock, having been busy feasting on nectar during July, are now starting to disappear as they take up their winter quarters.

Even so, there are still plenty of other butterflies to grace our gardens, especially Whites and Gatekeepers, and we can usually look forward to seeing Commas and Red Admirals on ivy flowers and fallen fruit as we pass from late summer into autumn.

### Reserves report

#### Magdalen Hill Down

There's been a lot of activity with a site visit from the National Landscapes Conference, two reserve butterfly walks, a Southern Water visit to see the chalk scrape and thirty PhD students investigating sustainability. The Big Butterfly Count launch was filmed at MHD, with local schools taking part being filmed live by BBC and ITV Meridian.

It's also been very 'fluttery' with the Chalk Hill Blues making a come-back, following last year's worst-ever records. The second brood of Adonis Blue has emerged, together with a

good number of other species, including Small Copper, Dark Green Fritillary and Common Blue.

It's become very parched on the hillside, with so much sunshine in June and July. The five cows are off for a couple of weeks at the Wildlife Trust's Hockley Farm, for TB checks. We haven't brought the sheep back, due to very little grass growth this year.

#### Yew Hill

We had a school visit from Oliver's Battery Primary School, Year 4. They walked from school and saw lots of wildlife along the way. It was a beautiful sunny day and Yew Hill was at its best. The children soaked-up the magic of being surrounded by dancing Chalk Hill Blues and Gatekeepers.

The butterfly walk kindly led by the wonderful Rupert Broadway, was also successful. With nine people, we counted seventeen species including Chalk Hill Blue, Small Copper, Common Blue, Brown Argus, Green-veined White, and Painted Lady. Such an enjoyable walk - thank you Rupert, and all those who came along!

### **Bentley Station Meadow**

We've had two volunteer days, cutting the transect route path and checking the fencing before the cows go in. It was so lovely to be greeted by a Silver-washed Fritillary, and quite a number of Common Blues. We saw butterflies throughout the day - which was really encouraging. Betony has spread along the ride and, with Tufted Vetch, was a haze of pink and purple.

As ever, the super-skilled volunteers sorted everything. Using scythes and a brushcutter they carefully opened-up paths and battled through the undergrowth to check all the fencing. Where it had been so dry huge cracks had formed in the ground. It was good to take time to enjoy the wildlife around us. Listening to birds, watching a lizard basking on an anthill, seeing numerous grasshoppers jumping about. And the exquisite Common Blues put on a great display. The cows should be introduced on-site by the end of August.

### **Chilcomb scrapes**

I was too late this year for the Striped Lychnis larvae count, along the Kings Lane and cycleway scrapes, everything was so early! I counted the Dark Mullein flower spikes and saw eight larvae in total - most had already pupated. The sports ground scrape was covered in flowers and had several Small White butterflies visit, while I was there.


